# **The Sigma Experiment**

CERT programs, disaster response, and volunteer initiatives everywhere all rely on one thing: trustworthy credentials. From program membership to advanced qualifications, these credentials allow us to safely participate, respond, and command. However, this often overlooked aspect of our operations is stuck using antiquated paper systems that haven't kept up with our rapidly evolving world of response procedures, and with the ever-increasing pace of natural and man-made disasters a solution is needed.

This year, the National CERT Conference is partnering with Sigma to issue digital credentials to all conference participants. Sigma is a free tool for organizations to securely issue and verify digital credentials that can be relied upon in every situation and verified instantly. Having all of your credentials in one place and accessible at your fingertips can more easily enable resource sharing between programs and effective deployment of qualified individuals when it matters most.

During the conference we will be checking-in attendees at some conference events using the Sigma app and issuing to you lasting digital credentials that you will have access to on your phone or computer. This will include training classes, breakout sessions, drills, and exhibitor booth visits. This will enable us to give credit where it is due, but also to see which sessions and trainings mattered most to improve future conferences.

In order to have a realistic experience we are asking for all conference attendees to participate. Please start yourself by registering with Sigma at <u>try.sig.ma/cert</u> now, or by visiting the registration desk, and accepting the credentials you have been issued. You will then be able to verify your digital credentials at each event you attend with Sigma's mobile app. There will be sign in sheets everywhere we do the tracking as a backup.

Conference and Sigma staff will track the information behind the scenes and issue you additional credentials as you complete activities. When the conference concludes we will send out a report that shows the different activities each conference attendee participated in along with variance in how active some attendees were compared to others.

By participating in this exercise and watching as we send reports out you will get an idea of how your CERT program can use a platform like Sigma to capture your volunteers' training and activity. #### **Distinguished Service**

Presented to a long-standing Florida CERT Volunteer who has demonstrated extensive leadership through sustained and significant contributions to the CERT organization.

#### Silver Star Award

Presented to an individual in Florida whose dedicated, unselfish and enthusiastic service has contributed to the growth and development of the CERT and Emergency Management communities.

#### NATIONAL AWARDS

#### Preparing the Whole Community

Presented to an organization, program, or jurisdiction that successfully engages the whole community to improve disaster preparedness and resilience; encourages and explores ways to develop whole community partnerships; and advocates a grassroots approach to emergency planning.

#### **Outstanding Inclusive Initiatives in Emergency Management**

Presented to an organization, program, or jurisdiction that has excelled in working with populations that are disproportionately impacted by disasters due to risks associated with economic status, limited English proficiency, cultural diversity, or access and functional needs in order to better prepare them for disasters.

### **Pre-Conference Sessions**

CERT Train-the-Trainer Course (L-428)

### Brenda Emrick, Chad Fitzgerald, Melanie Devine, River of Grass I

This course prepares participants to deliver the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) CERT Basic Training course and focuses on:

- Delivering the CERT Basic Training;
- Conveying the messages and intent of the CERT Program (e.g., safety, teamwork, place in overall community emergency operations plan);
- Assuring that students achieve the objectives of the CERT Basic Training; and
- Creating a comfortable yet managed learning environment.



#### Jake Heflin, Yolanda McGlinchey , Kit Marshall River of Grass H

This course prepares participants to establish and sustain an active local CERT program, defines the core components of a local CERT program and focuses on effective practices for:

- Developing local CERT program goals and a related strategic plan;
- Promoting local CERT programs;
- Orienting, managing, and retaining CERT members;
- Recruiting, funding, managing, and retaining CERT trainers;
- · Acquiring and managing program resources;
- Delivering and managing effective training and exercises;
- Developing policies and procedures for operating a local CERT program; and
- Evaluating and sustaining the program.

Introduction to Salvation Army Emergency Disaster Services

#### Jessica Geib - Track B River of Grass H

The gateway course to The Salvation Army's disaster training program, Introduction to The Salvation Army Emergency Disaster Services, is required for all disaster workers. The course offers an overview of The Salvation Army's mission, the services it provides during a disaster, and prepares participants for their first disaster assignment, describing everything from packing to travel to self-care. This course is available in both a classroom and an online self-study version and is a prerequisite for most other Salvation Army disaster training courses.



# **Pre-Conference Sessions**



Building a Roadmap to Resilience (L426)

#### Tyler Krska, Andrew Burrows Mangrove AB

This course helps prepare communities to build a Whole Community Approach to Emergency Management by teaching Principles, Themes, and Pathways for Action, and other promising practices uncovered by local leaders across the nation. Participants will develop a plan of implementation in their own community, receive the tools and knowledge to establish a community coalition, and learn to encourage local leaders to augment resilience within the unique circumstances of their community. Volunteer and Donations Management (G288)

#### Ken Skalitzky, Christy Rojas-Kasten River of Grass G

This training will support local governments and their emergency management partners in preparing for, responding to, and recovering from disaster events at the local level. The course is designed to strengthen the abilities of local iurisdictions to successfully prepare for and handle volunteer and donations management issues that may arise. The course content and activities may also serve as a template, thereby enhancing uniformity in addressing areas of donated unsolicited goods, unaffiliated volunteers, and undesignated cash. This training also provides information regarding the state's volunteer and donations management responsibilities, which are designed to help build relationships between government and non-governmental organizations.

You are the Help Until Help Arrives

#### Tyler Krska, Andrew Burrows Mangrove AB

Life-threatening emergencies can happen fast and emergency responders aren't always nearby. You may be able to save a life by taking simple actions immediately. This FEMA program will teach you how to:

- Use simple and effective skills to save lives;
- Effectively communicate with 9-1-1 Operations;
- Stay Safe;
- Stop life-threatening bleeding;
- Managing your body under stress; and
- Position the injured.

Management of Spontaneous Volunteers in a Disaster (G489)

#### Ken Skalitzky, Christy Rojas-Kasten River of Grass G

One of the most crucial activities for an emergency manager during a disaster is to ensure that disaster volunteers are effectively used in their impacted communities. The purpose of this course is to introduce the skills and planning considerations that are required to manage large numbers of people who are not affiliated with an experienced relief organization, but who want to help in disasters. These "spontaneous volunteers" are generally well motivated and sincerely want to help, but if their efforts and resources are not coordinated effectively their presence may be counterproductive and an added strain on the disaster area.



Mississippi Youth Preparedness Initiative

#### Ryan Akers, Dave Nichols Initiatives Track - Mangrove A

MyPI National is a two-time national award winning youth preparedness/youth leadership hybrid initiative that focuses on dynamic partnerships, producing a new model for preparedness education, a comprehensive curriculum, and a service campaign that emphasizes engagement, empowerment, and service/leadership within a relatively untapped population group, teenagers.

This campaign allows youth to be trained through an extensive curriculum, complete a capstone service project, be introduced to new technology and first responder-related career fields, participate in disaster simulations, etc. WATCHTOWER: Engaging CERT Volunteers from their home

#### Lisa Rubey Disaster Track - Mangrove B

Session will talk about the success of the new watchtower operations and using volunteers to monitor specific areas such as weather, traffic, social media, power outages and more in order to provide intel information to emergency responders that can use it. Volunteers are trained to find the intel using their home computers and report in at specified times to provide a greater picture. The speaker will talk about discovering the needs for your community and developing a watch tower for training and recruiting CERT members. Further discussion will focus on the success of the watchtower operations in several city events and in emergency response during Hurricane Harvey.

CERT Program Manager Questions and Answers

#### Tyler Krska, Ken Skalitzky, Christy Rojas-Kasten

#### Program Manager Track - Mangrove C

This is an opportunity for CERT Program Managers to ask FEMA and State level CERT Administrators any questions regarding CERT. Incorporating Firefighter Rehab into your CERT program

#### Kit Marshall, John Ignatczyk, Chris Winn, Cody Weireter Bonus Track - River of Grass G

This session will focus on teaching on how different CERT programs are using their CERT volunteers to assist with Firefighter Rehab activities during a fire response. Hear from programs in Texas and California.

**CERT-ifying Higher Education** 

#### Lorraine Schneider Initiatives Track - Mangrove A

After conducting a CERT-centric survey across all of higher education emergency management, which garnered over 40 responses ranging from community colleges to four-year universities from east to west, it has become clear that there is great interest in creating and maintaining a CERT program, but that many are lacking resources and know-how. Addressing the biggest challenges higher education expressed by emergency managers, this session focuses on how to create a viable, sustainable, and integrative CERT program from the ground up for Institutions of Higher Education (IHEs), while demonstrating the significant benefits of having local jurisdictions support Campus CERT to strengthen their preparedness community's emergency and response abilities.

Lessons Learned from the Unprecedented Disaster Response Season in 2017: Hurricanes Irma, Harvey and the Northern California Wildfire Debris Removal Missions

#### Brittany Perkins and other Panelists Disaster Track - Mangrove B

AshBritt Inc. CEO, Brittany Perkins will moderate a panel of debris removal and disaster response industry experts on lessons learned from 2017's unprecedented disaster season. Lessons learned will cover Hurricanes Harvey and Irma and the Northern California wildfires. Panelists will discuss the benefits of public-private partnerships, bolstering small-local business during a recovery, and effective mitigation and planning.

Mandarin CERT: A "Whole Community Approach to Emergency Management" Requires Whole Community Collaboration

### Robert Simmons, Christine Tully, Jordan Liu, Daniel Yeh

#### Program Manager Track - Mangrove C

In May 2018, the City of Irvine CERT program completed the first CERT class that was delivered entirely in Mandarin. It was a remarkable success, graduating a 50-member cohort of the Chinese community. The class received the same 28-hour training as every CERT class that had come before, and it could not have been accomplished without the "whole community collaboration" that took place. There was an incredible learning experience that occurred throughout the preparation and implementation of this new program. The speakers look forward to sharing how they navigated the process of delivering CERT in multiple languages and overcame obstacles they encountered along the way.

LISTOS: A Preparedness Program Created from the Ground Up for the Spanish Speaking Community

#### Yolanda McGlinchey Program Manager Track - Mangrove C

The goal of the LISTOS program is to provide basic resources to Latino populations for emergency readiness in an environment which they feel comfortable. Since that time, the Spanish speaking population has become more active in disaster preparedness and mitigation.

Since its inception, the program has grown and has not only reached most counties in California, but has outreached to the countries of Mexico and Chile.

#### Stop the Bleed

Today we live in a world where terrorism, the actions of unstable people, and the dangerous impulses of friends and relatives are very real and becoming increasingly more frequent. Massive bleeding from any cause, but particularly from an active shooter or explosive event where a response is delayed can result in death. Similar to how the general public learns and performs CPR, the public must learn proper bleeding control techniques, including how to use their hands, dressings, and tourniquets. Victims can quickly die from uncontrolled bleeding, within five to 10 minutes. However, anyone at the scene can act as an immediate responder and save lives if they know what to do.
